I did my medical graduation in 1985 after doing one-year internship and 2-year residency in internal medicine I joined Sindh Institute of Urology and Transplantation (SIUT) in 1989 as Trainee in field of Nephrology. Got my post-graduation in Nephrology while remained associated with same institution. Got clinical attachment at Dept. of Renal Medicine and Transplantation, at Royal London Hospital, & St Bartholomew's Hospital, London, UK from Aug. 1999 to Feb.2000. Got research fellowship of one year awarded by International Society of Nephrology and trained at Molecular Lab of Weill Medical College and Hospital associated with Cornell University New York from July 2004 to June 2005. Returned to mother institution after completing fellowship and still associated with same institution, now holding Professorship since Feb. 2011.
